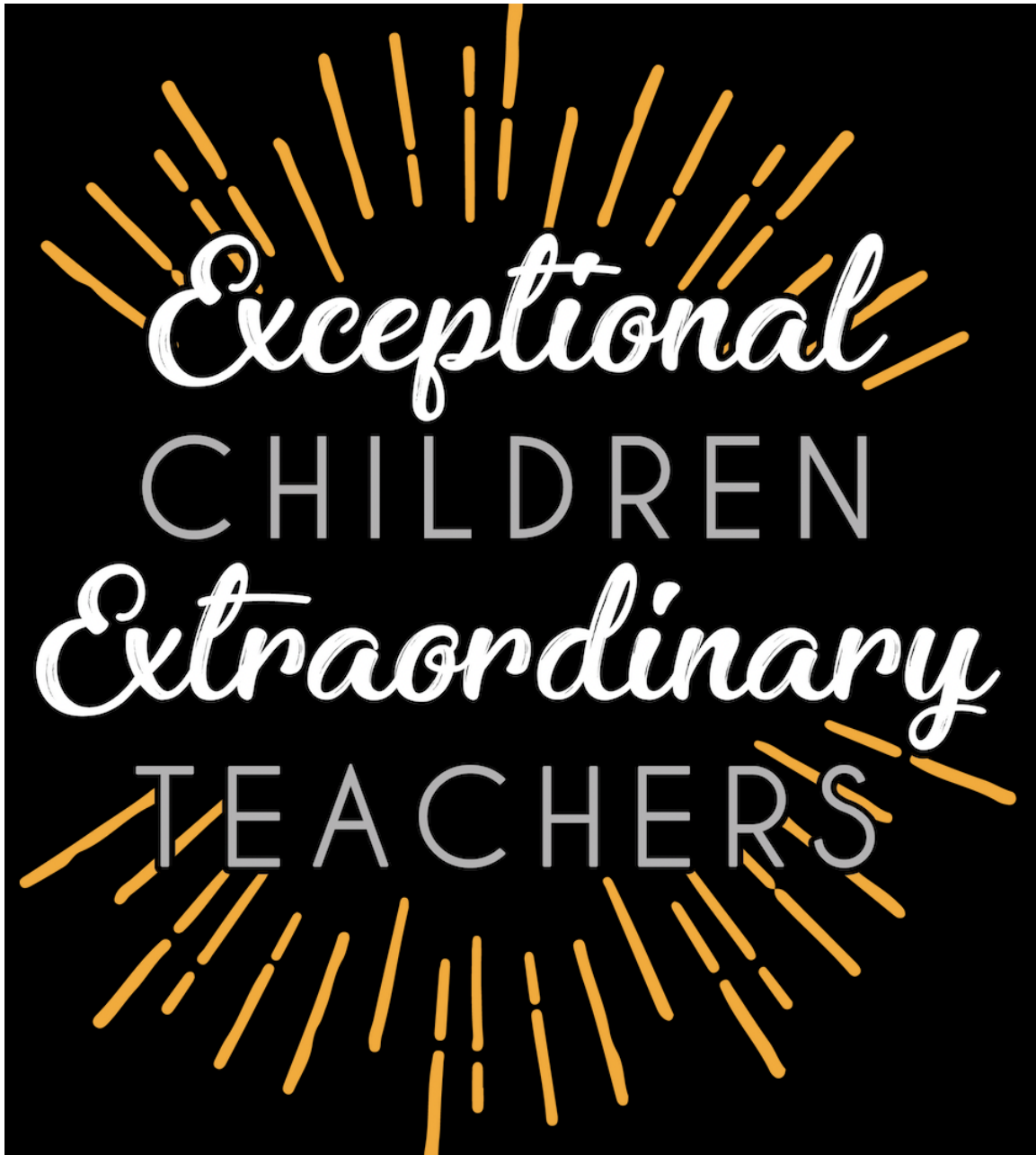

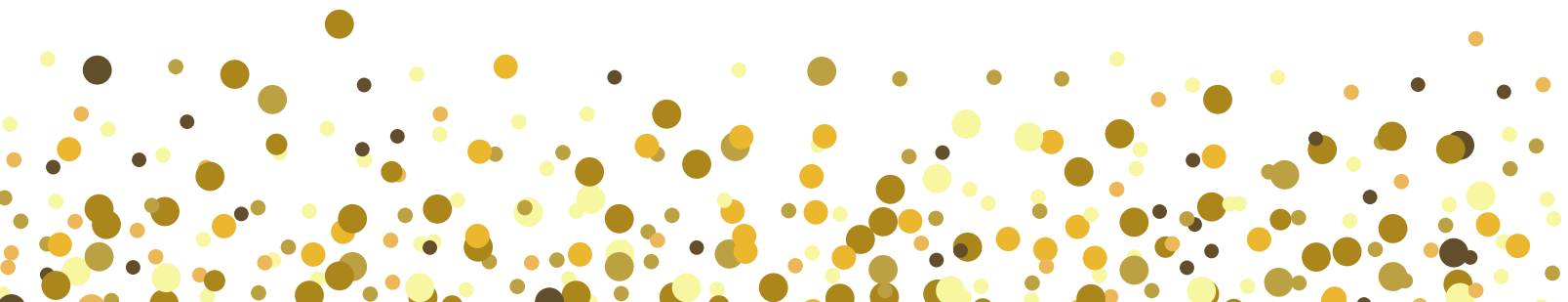

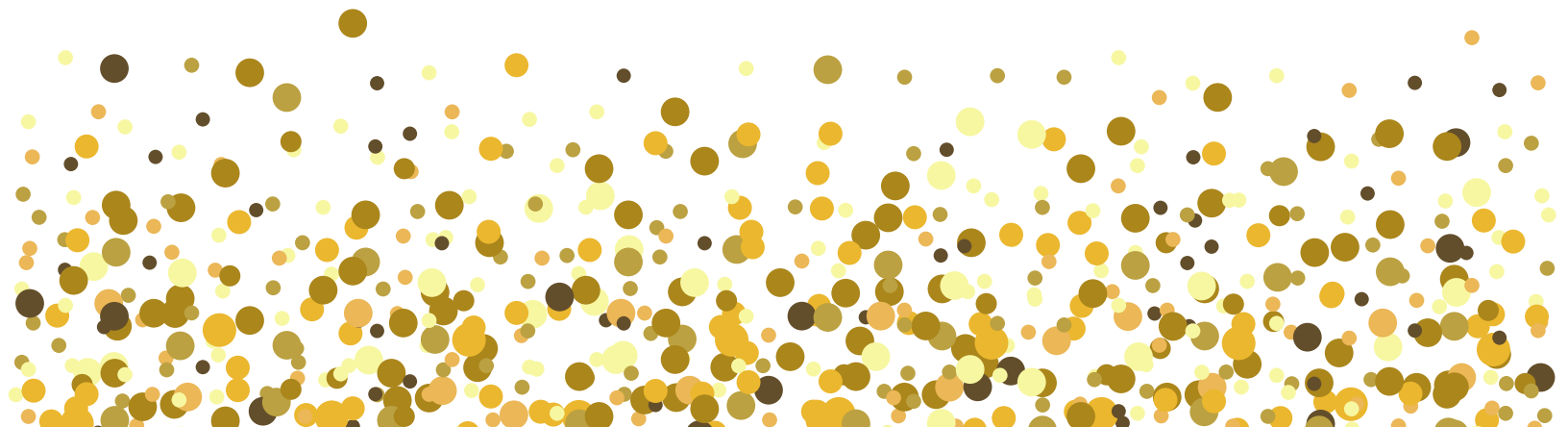

Pre-Conference Session 1:

Executive Function Interventions – A Toolbox of Strategies

Presented by Sarah Ward

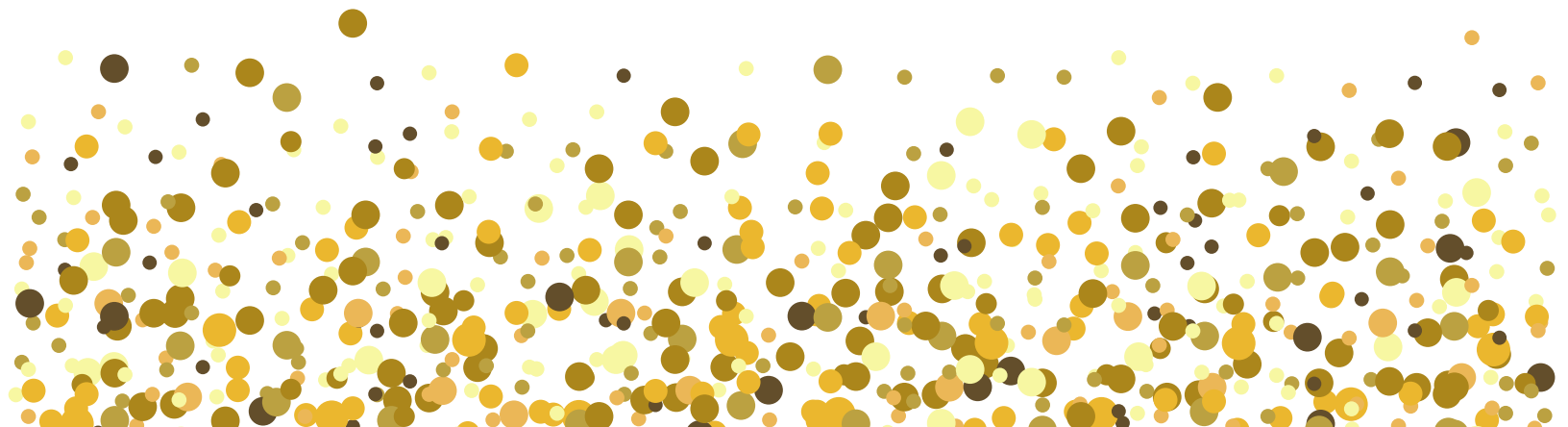
This Pre-Conference is for the professional who wants to learn more strategies and techniques, have advanced treatment examples, and become more knowledgeable of the scope and sequence to implement executive function interventions. This seminar will help you to understand where to start and give you the opportunity to make and practice implementing a Toolbox of Strategies for teaching executive function skills. We will address at an advanced level how to teach students to channel their motivation and go from Intention to Action by creating and carrying out plans and to sustain forethought for tasks. Understand the relationship between speed of processing and executive function and learn practical strategies to improve written expression and how to tackle complex novel and open ended assignments and projects. Do you feel like you spend the majority of resource room/learning center/treatment time “putting out fires” and there does not seem to be time to teach the executive skills? This webinar will address how to use assignments and classwork as the tools to build the executive function skills! It is a win-win!

Divergent Planning: SDI to Improve Student Outcomes

Participants will engage in a divergent planning process to use specially designed instruction to improve outcomes (academically and socially) for students with disabilities. The process will evaluate systemic changes, clarify roles of educators, analyze instructional strategies, and expand access for students with disabilities.



Keynote Sessions

Learn it Today – Use it Tomorrow! Cutting Edge Strategies to Improve Executive Function Skills in the Classroom

Presented by Sarah Ward. MS. CCC/SLP

How to Teach Students to Efficiently Initiate, Transition, Plan and Manage their Tasks, Time Space and Materials (and keep their emotions in check!)

This seminar is all about providing dozens of practical strategies that you can learn today and implement tomorrow! From task initiation and execution to time management, practice using strategies such as 'Future Sketch', 'Get Ready, Do, Done', 'STOP and Read the Room', and seeing and sensing the passage of time. Classroom and remote instruction strategies will be given.

During this Workshop through demonstration and practice you will learn how to teach students the following executive control skills:

- Awareness: to "Tune in" to what is happening around them so they can understand how information, events, and their actions will impact their goals and objectives, both now and in the near future
- Forethought: to predict the successful outcome of tasks and to know what a 'stop spot' looks like
- to Wait: to control a reaction long enough to contemplate the outcomes of their choices
- Planning Skills to be able to sense the passage of time and to know how to break down the steps for immediate tasks, and assignments.
- to Shift: Fresh approaches to help students develop automaticity for class routines and fluidly transition from one mental mindset to another and to be able to stop doing one activity and then move on to and be prepared to start new tasks
- to Pace: to speed up or slow down within a given time frame, to complete tasks within allotted time and to persist on tasks even if the tasks are difficult, boring or nonpreferred

Breakout Sessions

Adapting Grade-Level Text for Students with Significant Cognitive Disabilities

Presented by Denise Harrison & Melanie Watkins

In this hands-on presentation, participants will not only learn about the research that supports increased reading comprehension outcomes for students with significant cognitive disabilities but will also engage in the process of creating their own adaptive, grade-level text to use with their students to promote comprehension. Participants will be able to create accessible, grade-level texts for their students with significant cognitive disabilities, including physical and digital adaptations.

Co-Teaching within the Middle School Settings

Presented by Alice Stringer

Co-teaching in the middle school setting looks a lot different than in other grades such as the elementary and high school levels. My session will explain how the multiple school settings approach co-teaching and describe how each one looks within each school setting. Co-teaching with middle school teachers allows everyone involved to give valuable input as well as use each other's stronger abilities to provide the best possible approach. The idea of parallel teaching is sometimes hard to put into practice without some sort of plan of action.

Efficient Plan Management and Progress Monitoring Tools for Extraordinary Educators

Do what you do...just make one tiny tweak and turn the core classroom objectives and tasks into powerful tools to teach students executive control skills for classroom and treatment interventions.

The 'Get Ready * Do * Done' program teaches students the process of how to visualize simple, multi-step and complex tasks and assignments and then sequence and plan the requisite steps to fully complete work.

Get More Bang for Your Buck

Structured Teaching for Students with Significant Cognitive Disabilities

Presented by Paige Pigott

This session is an overview of a center-based classroom management training designed to provide educators of students with significant cognitive disabilities, non-verbal students, and students with communication disorders with the knowledge of classroom set-up including floor plan arrangement to implementation of visual structure through individual schedules, work systems, and other supports to successfully manage a classroom with multiple students functioning on a variety of instructional levels. Structure provides students with the support they need to understand where they should be, what they should be doing, and how long they should be doing activities. By providing visual support and structure to address these three core areas students develop in-seat on-task appropriate behavior, limit self-stimulatory behaviors, build independence, and improve overall compliance directly impacting student achievement and outcomes.

Teaming and Collaborating: Building Relationships with Parents

Presented by Leslie Junkin

The teaming and collaborating component for families is often overwhelming and can be frustrating when they don't understand the process. Family members and other team members need to exchange information and share knowledge and expertise in ways that are respectful, supportive, enhance capacity, and are culturally responsive. How can we work together to reduce barriers, help parents understand the process, and learn to be part of the decision making team? Recommended Practices help prepare professionals and by using the Family Guides we can help prepare parents as they learn how to build relationships with the teams that support them and their child.

The Brain Game

Early experiences affect the development of brain architecture, which provides the foundation for all future learning, behavior, and health. Just as a weak foundation compromises the quality and strength of a house, adverse experiences early in life can impair brain architecture, with negative effects lasting into adulthood. This experience is designed to engage attendees in understanding the science of early brain development-what promotes it, what derails it, and what the consequences are for society.

The First Essential Worker: Tools for the P.U.R.P.O.S.E Driven Educator

Presented by Chadiah Williams

Being a P.U.R.P.O.S.E.-driven educator in and outside the classroom, is quintessential for every teacher. This approach focuses on ones ability to be a Problem-solver, Unique, Resilient, Prosperous, provide Opportunity, be Successful and maintain confidence in being Essential.

These seven tenants provide a framework that will focus on the educators ability to increase their personal self-care, boost student achievement and ultimately realign with their personal and professional goals. Educators are some of the most self-LESS humans on Earth, as you/we have to exert yourselves emotionally, physically and mentally. The dedication to such a task, relies solely upon the development and success of the leaders of our future, exceptional student.

The Power in the Post It Note: Developing Relationships with Students Exhibiting Difficult Behaviors

In this session, participants will discuss building relationships with students who exhibit difficult behaviors, with focus on the challenges these students tend to present and methods to assist in building relationships with them.

Using High-Leverage Practices (HLPs) to Structure Professional Learning in Mississippi's Mentor Pilot Program to Increase Program Effectiveness and Support for New Special Education Teachers

In this session, participants will learn how High-Leverage Practices (HLPs) were used to structure professional learning in Mississippi's Mentor Pilot Program during the 2021-2022 school year, lessons learned, and how HLPs were prioritized for professional learning moving forward into the 2022 - 2023 school year. Resources for HLP implementation and professional learning will be shared, in addition to resources to help school districts to implement an effective induction and mentoring program to support new teachers. Finally, details regarding the HLP Exemplar Video and Resources Competition will be shared to inform teachers how they can submit exemplar videos and other supplemental resources for possible monetary compensation and use on Mississippi's future HLP professional learning website.

Using Office 365 Multiple Ways and using QR codes

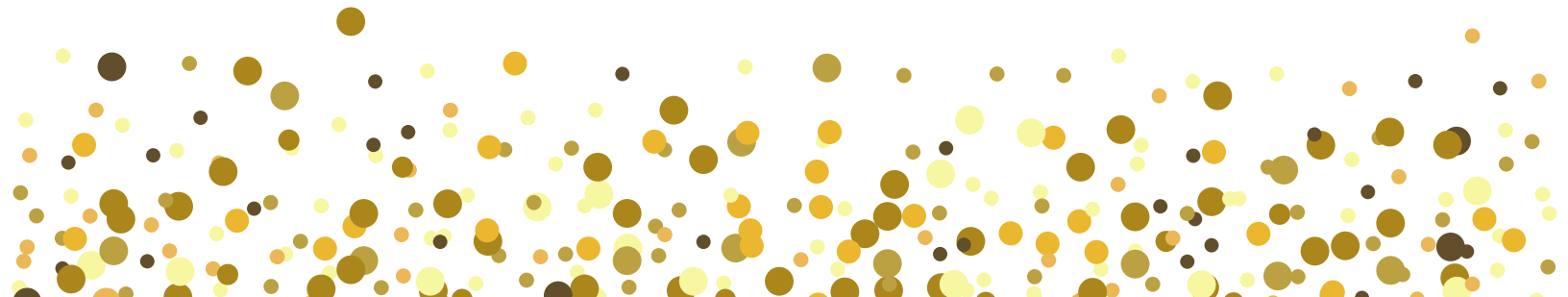

During this session, the participants discover how to use Microsoft forms in a valuable way to collect data from time within a classroom to behavioral tracking that all teachers are willing to fill out. I will explain how to use QR codes in the classroom to tie everything together.

Using Social Emotional Learning to Address the Impact of Fatherlessness

Presented by Dr. Clayton Barksdale

Research shows that a large percentage of exceptional children are raised in single family homes; specifically, homes where the father is absent. This workshop will teach attendees peer reviewed strategies on how to effectively educate fatherless students using social emotional learning (SEL). Attendees will understand the heavy psychological burden that fatherless exceptional children are bearing. Additionally, educators will learn the many benefits of SEL, once used correctly, it can be an effective tool to help children manage stress and other trauma which will decrease behavioral problems.



Session Presenters

Kajesha Adams

Ms. Kanesha Adams is a Ph.D. student in the Educational Leadership department at the University of Alabama. She is an educator, advocate, and “change agent.” She currently serves as the CEO and Founder of Bearapy Bookshelf, which is a social literacy organization wrapped around three pillars; representation in text, teaching emotional and social resilience, and trauma recovery. In addition to this work, she serves as a Communities Engagement Specialist with Bright Futures Arkansas.

Ms. Adams is a 2020 graduate of Arkansas’s inaugural cohort for the New Leaders Council where she has received hands-on support for her educational startup, known as Bearapy Bookshelf. Kanesha is a newly self-published children's book author, with her recent title "Sisters Forever" commemorating the relationship of her first best friend, her sister.

Dr. Clayton Barksdale

Dr. Clayton Barksdale has been an educator for over 20 years and has served on all levels of education as a teacher, librarian, college professor, assistant principal and consultant. Currently he serves as assistant principal at Cleveland Central Middle School and behavioral counselor at the Behavioral and Counseling Center for Fatherless Children. He serves as an educational consultant at Rosemont Consulting where he offers professional development to school districts and teach educators how to reach fatherless children using social emotional learning. Dr. Barksdale has written three books and has received many awards including the prestigious Certificate of Special Congressional Recognition from Congressman Bennie Thompson.

Kashonda Day

Ms. KaShonda L. Day started her career as a school teacher and later became an education consultant. Now as a lawyer representing school districts, she brings a deep understanding of how schools work – the daily lives of teachers and administrators – to the legal counsel that I provide.

Ms. Day joined Adams and Reese after serving as the Assistant District Counsel for the Jackson Public School District for seven years, where she provided routine legal advice and assistance to the administrative staff. She also represented the district in various litigation and administrative matters. Severina Despenza

Ms. Severina Nicholl-DeSpenza is an Implementation with Really Great Reading. She has acquired extensive training in Infant/Toddler, Pre-K and K-12 teacher-child interactions, infant mental health, and early, adolescent and adult literacy. She holds a B.S in Psychology, M.A.T in Education, and a M.A. in Educational Leadership.

Ellen Ellis

Ms. Ellen Ellis is serving her first year as the Behavior Specialist for the special education students in the Pearl Public School District. Prior to this position, Ellen was one of the 2nd and 3rd grade self-contained special education teachers at Northside Elementary School. She served in that position for 10 years. Mrs. Ellis earned her degree in Special Education from Mississippi State University. She then completed her Masters in Emotional and Behavioral Disorders from William Carey and her Specialist in Educational Leadership from William Carey. She is also a National Board-Certified Teacher.

Denise Harrison

Ms. Denise Harrison is a Special Education Professional Development Coordinator with the Mississippi Department of Education-Office of Special Education, along with the Office of Professional Development and the University of Mississippi. She has been in the field of education for 21 years. Thirteen of those years, Denise taught students with significant cognitive deficits. Denise earned her Master of Education degree in Special Education from Arkansas State University. She received her National Board Certification in 2011. Denise is pursuing her Doctor of Philosophy degree in Special Education from the University of Mississippi.

Lori Henry

Ms. Lori Henry is a Certified Autism Specialist and works for Pearl Upper Elementary as the self-contained special education teacher. She has worked in this position for the last 6 years. In addition to working at Pearl, she also serves as the Volunteer Advocacy Ambassador for the State of Mississippi with Autism Speaks. Mrs. Henry earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in Elementary Education from the University of Southern Mississippi. Mrs. Henry also received a Masters of Education degree in Emotional and Behavioral Disorders of Children and a Specialist degree in Educational Leadership from William Carey University.
